STATE LEVEL CONSULTATIONS

The Role of NGOs in Total Sanitation Campaign and Swajaldhara

Orissa State Water and Sanitation Mission, in collaboration with Water Aid, organized a State-level Consultation on the Role of NGOs in the Total Sanitation Campaign and in the implementation of Swajaldhara scheme at Bhubaneswar on 21st July 2005. The objective of the workshop was to bring together all the stakeholders on a single platform, where they could share their experiences, the success they achieved and the difficulties they encountered.



State Level Consultation on the Role of NGOs

Sri Aurobindo Behera, Commissioner-cum-Secretary, Rural Development Department inaugurated the workshop at 10 A.M. Sri Behera called upon the implementing agencies, officers and volunteers to work harder to improve their performance so that Orissa would soon become a role model in the country. While addressing the gathering, Sri Behera expressed his anguish over the fact that people of Orissa suffer from self-pity and do not even publicize their impressive achievements. He laid emphasis on *speed and scale*

without making compromise on quality and cost in any programme implemented on campaign-mode. He hoped that the workshop would highlight the best practices of different NGOs, which could be replicated in other areas.

Addressing the participants, Sri Anand Sekhar, Regional Manager, Water Aid, Orissa underscored the role of NGOs in the implementation of this programme. He said that creating tangible assets such as latrines and school toilet blocks is certainly important but still more important is their use and maintenance. NGOs could play an effective role in motivating the community to use and maintain these assets. He assured all help from Water Aid to the State Government. and the NGOs working in this sector.

Mr. Tom Olsen, State Representative, UNICEF, Bhubaneswar, said that the money and labour we spend on TSC should not be viewed as expenditure; it is an investment in building our future. He pointed out that the use of latrines is directly linked with the rise/fall of Infant Mortality Rate (IMR), which is a key indicator of development.

Earlier, Sri P. C. Rath, Chief Engineer-cum-Director, OSWSM had welcomed the participants and expressed the hope that the deliberations would be meaningful. Panel discussions were held on technology options, IEC and hygiene promotion, school sanitation and alternative delivery systems. At the end, the Director proposed a vote of thanks for all the participants for their active participation in the workshop.
